Key Assessment Findings

Comprehensive exams are a requirement for both M.A. and Ph.D. students in the Semitics department. The M.A. comprehensive exams are designed to demonstrate that the student has reached an acceptable level of competence in his/her major and minor languages. Presuming competence in these languages, the Ph.D. comprehensive exams test the student's abilities to interpret selected passages from texts pertinent to the student's academic focus and to answer a set of linguistic, cultural, and historical questions based on these selected texts.

The number of students who took M.A. and Ph.D. comprehensive examinations in AY2010-2011 was a total of 12. All students except one passed with a level within the rubrics of "2" (meeting expectations), with the new rubrics fully implemented as of the summer of 2010, which results are included within this report. The results table for the past two AY's is appended at the end of this report. The exception was one student who failed (achieved a level of "1" or below) 1 of 2 MA comprehensives. The rest of the students achieved a "2" (meeting expectations) or "3" level (exceeded expectations) (see tables below). In general, the rubrics have proved useful; however, since the comprehensive exams are not standardized (that is, different questions are set for different students) it can be hard exactly to quantify performances within the broad wording of the rubrics. The table of rubrics results are appended below .

Curricular Improvements for Master's Program and Ph.D. Program

The planned language placement exams in the area of Biblical Hebrew have not yet been prepared for use. They will not be principally relevant for students admitted within the department, but will have an impact on judging the readiness of non-departmental students (principally from the School of Theology) to take graduate courses in Biblical Hebrew.

Curricular improvements have been implemented for the 2011-2012 school year as follows:

- o Six credits in ancient Greek, previously a departmental requirement for every degree, is now a requirement only for the degrees in Near Eastern Christian Languages and Literatures.
- The additional requirement to take electives outside of the department has been changed to a recommendation.
- o The previous requirement of 12 credit hours in the major language beyond the beginning course has been reduced to 9 credit hours beyond the beginning course. This was changed

principally for the benefit of students who chose Arabic as their major language; since the beginning course in Arabic lasts 2 semesters, MA students were unable to accrue credits for the language until their second year. In many cases, they had reached a third year of course work before accumulating the required number of credits. The reduced requirement will now allow MA students to choose Arabic as a major language and to take MA comprehensives in Arabic by the end of their second year of coursework.

The summer curriculum is under review. The courses offered in Syriac and Classical Armenian were successful, but no students registered for Coptic or Biblical Hebrew. It is hoped that a renewed departmental effort to vary and publicize our offerings will attract more students to the summer session.
