Key Assessment Findings

MA/PhD programs

Rubrics have been developed for two parts of the MA comprehensive exams: the Latin and Greek translation exams. During this academic year, four students took comprehensive exams at the MA level, **four** in Greek and **one** in Latin. Because of the small number, collected data will not be reported in order to preserve confidentiality. The data will be aggregated and reported in the five year report.

A rubric has also been developed for the two seminar papers required for the MA. Because only **four** students submitted these during the academic year, collected data will not be reported in order to preserve confidentiality. The data will be aggregated and reported in the five year report.

Certificate programs

Certificate students are required to take five Greek and/or Latin courses beyond the intermediate level. They do not take comprehensive exams or submit seminar papers. The main means of assessing their progress are their grades in two required courses—LAT 511 and GR 511—and their performance on the Greek and Latin morphology tests, for which rubrics have been developed. Because fewer than five students took the Latin and Greek morphology tests during this academic year, collected data will not be reported. Aggregated data will be presented in the five year report.

Curricular Improvements

Because morphology tests for certificate students are not used in the same way by the faculty who teach LAT 511 and GR 511, they do not appear to represent a reliable means by which to assess progress in the program. The department will request that this measure be dropped from future assessment findings.
